Thank you for participating in Public History Weekly! To ensure a smooth editorial process from your first draft to the published article, we kindly ask you to follow our guidelines:

- All PHW texts use the following pattern:
 - o Intriguing headline of max. 50 characters.
 - An <u>abstract of max. 500 characters</u> introducing the topic, main argument and method.
 - o A <u>teaser of max. 500 characters</u> drawing the reader into your peace.
 - The article with max. 10,000 characters, broken up by 3-5 sub headlines of max. 50 characters each.
- The supplements to each article are as follows:
 - <u>2-3 links</u> to websites, projects, videos anything goes except for links to journal articles.
 - o **2-3 pieces for further reading**, e.g. journal articles, books.
 - Footnotes and further reading use the Chicago citation style:
 https://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools citationguide/citation-guide-1.html.
 - Please use the standard MS Word footnote feature.¹
 - An image in landscape format under a free license (Public Domain, Creative Commons, or your own work). If you don't provide an image, our editors whill choose one they deem fit.
